

# **Benefits of Breastfeeding**



- Reduces the risk of gastrointestinal illness e.g. diarrhoea
- Fewer ear infections
- · Fewer respiratory illnesses
- Reduces chance of asthma and allergies

## Long Term

- Reduces the risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome
- Reduces the likelihood of obesity
- Reduces the risk of childhood leukaemia
- Promotes sensory and cognitive development therefore increase the likelihood of having a higher IQ
- Reduces the likelihood of high blood pressure and high cholesterol in later life
- Reduces the likelihood of type 2 diabetes

### **Antibodies**



Breastmilk contains important **antibodies** to fight infections and keep the baby healthy.

Breastfeeding can help create a **stronger bond** between mother and baby. This can reduce risk of postpartum depression and child abuse.



### **For Mothers**

- Breastfeeding helps mothers to lose pregnancy weight quicker
- Reduces the risk of breast cancer and ovarian cancer
- When breastfeeding hormones are released that help the uterus return to pre-pregnancy size

Financial Benefits



Breastmilk is **free**. Compared to using formula, breastmilk can save around £6-£32 per week.




